A MUST-WIN GAME FOR THE BUCKEYES

A columnist for Pennlive.com tried to argue before the Penn State game that PSU had surpassed Michigan as our top rival and that we Buckeyes should admit as much. I dropped him a note acknowledging that while the Nittany Lions certainly have become our second biggest rival, it would be next to impossible for them to ever surpass that School from Up North in this category due to the tradition involved.

It really doesn't matter how low the Weasels go, or how high the Nittany Lions might rise. Ohio State vs. UM is the greatest rivalry in sports and the fact that the Wolverines are amidst a historic downturn does not diminish how much we still want and need to vanquish the Maize & Blue. Buckeye fans need only reflect back to the dark times of the 1990s to recall the bitter taste of one heartbreaking defeat after another, and how smug and obnoxious the Wolverine fans were while winning 10 of 13 contests during the interminable John Cooper era.

The low point came in 1997. The Wolverines were undefeated and playing for a shot at the national title in the Rose Bowl, after having ruined such opportunities for

the Buckeyes by upsetting our undefeated squads in both '95 and '96. When Cooper was introduced as head coach of the Buckeyes before the game, the Big House crowd actually cheered! Had hell frozen

over? My dad and I looked at each other and just shook our heads in disgust, as it was beyond embarrassment. But it was perfectly logical considering Cooper's 1-7-1 record in the series. Dad said that if Cooper had a shred of self-respect, he should have resigned immediately. Another heartbreaking defeat followed, of course (Cooper never won in Ann Arbor).

But how the tables have turned in the 21st century thanks to Jim Tressel. Fast forward to 2007 as the Bucks were shooting for their fourth consecutive win in the series and six out of seven in the Tressel era. When Tressel was introduced, the

Wolverine crowd booed loudly and order was restored to the cosmos. My dad and I high-fived and enjoyed a historic performance by the Buckeye defense, which held the Wolverines to about 100

yards of total offense and sent Hart, Henne, and Long into history with a permanent 0-4 record in The Game.

QB Terrelle Pryor led the Bucks to a 42-7 whipping of UM last season to give OSU a historic fifth consecutive win in the series. Did the fact that the Wolverines came in as hapless underdogs diminish how enjoyable that game was? Not one bit! Sure, The Horseshoe wasn't quite as fired up as At The Game of the Century in 2006 (or even the 2004 game when we were underdogs and therefore needed to cheer extra hard to will the team to victory), but kicking the Wolverines' butt when

they were down was paramount to prevent them from gaining a momentum-changing win for their program.

That is why this year's game remains absolutely critical. Even if we have beaten Iowa and clinched the Rose Bowl, it is imperative to defeat the Wolveriness again to prevent them from gaining the momentum-changer that could help the embattled Rich Rod turn the program around. The Buckeyes can afford to show no mercy, for none would be offered if the tables were turned. GO BUCKS, BEAT BLUE!

BUCKEYE FOOTBALL 2009 SEASON RECAP

Buckeye fans have had their share of ups and downs this season, but that is what makes college football exciting. The season started with a close call against a stubborn Navy team, where the Buckeyes needed a strong defensive effort to win the game. The second game was believed to be a redemption game for the Buckeyes, to win on a big stage, against top competition. The offense could not put up enough points to win against USC. The defense responded after giving up a late touchdown against USC to shut out the next two opponents, Toledo and Illinois. The defense

continued to look impressive against a surprisingly good Indiana team and scored the majority of the points in the contest against Wisconsin. The Buckeyes went into the game against Purdue and were reminded that you cannot overlook anyone in the Big Ten, or college football, for that matter. Neither the offense nor defense appeared to be in the game during the lackluster performance against Purdue. However, both units responded in the next two games. The defense allowed only 7 points in mop-up duty against Minnesota and zero points against an overmatched New Mexico

State. The game against Penn State was viewed to be a test for both teams. Penn State's high-powered offense was going against the stubborn OSU defense. The OSU defense proved to be the stronger of the two units. The Buckeye offense, led by Pryor, proved to be efficient enough to put up 24 points while the Buckeye defense only allowed 7 points to the Penn State offense that had averaged more than 30 points per game. The OSU defense has been impressive and as of this writing is ranked #5 nationally in points per game (11.2) and 11th in both rush yards per game (85.4) and total yards per game (254). The pass defense is solid this year ranking 37th nationally, allowing 160 yards per game.

The Buckeyes were able to control their own destiny in their quest to win a 5th straight Big Ten title after Iowa's lost to Northwestern. Iowa had a number of close calls this year and were without their starting QB, who had a severely sprained ankle and had to sit on the bench and watch the game that decided the champion of the conference and a trip to the Rose Bowl. It could not have been more exciting as the Buckeyes took a two touchdown lead in the 4th quarter, but a special teams touchdown and a spirited performance from Iowa's Freshman backup QB lead the Hawkeyes back and tied

the game to send it in to overtime. In a fashion reminiscent of 2002, the Buckeyes kicked a field goal in overtime to win and started to smell the roses in Pasadena.

At this point the game with that team up north is all but academic. There will still be bragging rights on the line as another trip to Ann Arbor could potentially put the nail in the Rich Rodriguez coaching coffin for the Wolverines. The Buckeyes are currently ranked #10 in the BCS, but its unlikely they can play themselves into the top 5 with 6 undefeated teams above them at this time. Three of those undefeated teams above the Buckeyes are from conferences that are not typically represented in the BCS top 10, TCU, Cincinnati and Boise State, all three of which have very weak schedules remaining and should win out. The winner of the PAC 10 is still in doubt with Oregon holding the current lead in the conference and with Stanford and Oregon State still in the mix. It does not appear that a rematch with USC is on the horizon as they have slipped to 4-3 in the conference. Hopefully the Ohio State offense will continue to improve and the defense can lead the way to a win against the winner of the PAC 10.

WHAT'S NEW IN BUCKEYE BASKETBALL

For the first time in four years Thad Matta and OSU Men's Basketball team can answer, not much.

In the fall of 2005, in Matta's second year, the team returned the entire starting line up – Jamar Butler, Ron Lewis, J.J. Sullinger, Matt Sylvester and Terrance Dials. In the preseason that team was picked to finish in the middle of the pack in the Big Ten. Instead they finished 26-6, winning the Big Ten regular season and tournament championships. Since that season a parade of one-and-done players (Greg Oden, Mike Conley, Daequan Cook, and Kosta Koufos) have lead to a fresh start every year.

This year, like 2005, almost the entire team is back. The only missing piece is B.J. Mullens, who was the Big Ten 6th man of the year and Matta's third one-and-done seven footer in as many years.



The Returning Starters The Wild Cards

P.J. Hill – 6'1" senior point guard. P.J. made great strides last year; he actually took and made shots in the last quarter of last season. He will not start at point guard this season.

Jon Deibler – 6'6" junior wing/guard/forward. Jon lead the team in minutes played, 3-point shots taken and made (at a 41% clip for the year).

William Buford – 6'5" sophomore wing/guard/forward. William is the most athletic player on the team; he is a quick, speedy, high flyer who can score from outside the three-point line and can also finish plays from above the hoop.

Evan Turner – 6'7" junior forward. Evan was mister do-it-all for the Bucks last year. He led the team in scoring, rebounding, assists, and turnovers. Oops! Need to do better there.

Dallas Lauderdale – 6'8" junior center. Dallas is a powerhouse with great ups whose calling cards are rebounding and defense. He had his best offensive games of the season in the Big Ten and NCAA tournaments. Dallas broke his hand in a pickup game in early October. He returned to practice just in time for the start of the season.

David Lighty – 6'5" junior forward. David had his best game of the year (21 points, 4 assists, 7 rebounds and 3 steals) just before going down with a broken foot and missing the last 26 games of the year. David has two years of eligibility remaining.

Nikola Kecman – 6'8" sophomore forward. Nikola has been in the program for a year. Last season he had to sit for the first 12 games due to a wacky ruling by the NCAA. He played very well in one game (6 points and 5 rebounds in 11 minutes) before tearing his ACL in practice.

Zisis Sarikopoulos – 7'0" sophomore center. Big Z is a transfer from UAB. He is a raw talent who will come off the bench and help this team with defense and rebounding.

The Not So Familiar Faces

Walter Offutt – 6'3" sophomore guard. Walter came into the program last year still recovering from reconstructive knee surgery. He showed signs of growing confidence on the court at the end of the year; the coaching staff expects him to be a significant contributor this season.

Jeremie Simmons – 6'2" senior guard. Jeremie

transferred to OSU from Mott Community College in Flint, Michigan last year. He played significant minutes last year, but struggled attempting to fill the point guard role. The coaching staff has moved him to shooting guard position, which they feel, better suits his skills.

Kyle Madsen – 6'9" senior center. Kyle transferred to OSU from Vanderbilt in fall of 2006. After sitting that year, this is his third year of availability to coaching staff. He has always looked smaller than his listed height and weight (240 lbs). Not a good sign. With both Lauderdale and Sarikopoulos banged up, he will see significant minutes at the start of the season.

The Practice Fodder (Walk-Ons)

Danny Peters and Mark Titus have been in the program for three years. Mark Titus is known as the team jokester; last year he announced in press conference that he had decided not to leave early for the NBA. He has an amusing blog called clubtrillion.com; check it out.

Eddie Days and Dustin Reynolds both joined the team this fall and are juniors in eligibility.

The Outlook

This Buckeye team is deep – all eleven scholarship

players will have minutes on the court while the game is doubt. They are long, fast and athletic; they are veteran and they shoot the ball very well. After playing mostly zone the last two years, the team has spent a lot of practice time this fall getting reacquainted with man defense. I expect them to be very versatile defensively this season in an attempt to confuse their opponents with a variety of zone and man looks.

The major weakness on this team is at starting point guard. They don't have one. Since Evan Turner is the solution to every problem, he has moved to point. Evan had the ball in his hands in crunch time last year, but that is a far cry from running the club the entire game. There are many problems with this change: it puts their best rebounder 30 feet from the basket; it makes their best scorer responsible for getting everybody else their shots; it puts the ball in the hands of a guy who was a turnover machine at times last year. Most pundits are reserving judgment on this experiment.

Rebounding has also been a problem the last two years. I will believe they have fixed it when I see it.

However, if the Evan Turner experiment is successful, if

As usual, Jim Foster's Lady Buckeyes have been picked to win the Big Ten; as usual, they have the reigning Big Ten Player of the Year. The new and exciting element is their top 3 preseason ranking. A run to the national championship is well within the realm of possibility.

The "Of-the-Year" players

Jantel Lavender – 6'4" junior center. Jantel is the two-time Big Ten Player of the Year. She is not only the best player in the Big Ten, she is among the best in the country. This past summer Jantel was the second leading scorer and rebounder for the gold medal-winning team at World University games in Serbia.

Samantha Prahalis – 5'7" sophomore point guard. Sammy was the Freshman of the Year in the Big Ten. In this write-up last year I predicted that she would be the best point guard, man or woman, at OSU. Nothing has happened to change that opinion. This past summer she helped the USA U19 team to the gold medal in Thailand.

Shavelle Little – 5'8' senior guard. Shavelle is the two-time Defensive Player of the year in the Big Ten. It is very difficult for a smallish guard to dominate the defensive end of the floor, but Shavelle manages it with tenacity, quickness, anticipation, high energy and grit. She strikes fear into the heart of every point guard she faces.

The Fresh Faces To Watch For

Amber Stokes – 5'10" (rs) freshman shooting guard. There was almost as much excitement around Amber last year as Prahalis. Unfortunately, she hurt her shoulder in pre-season and sat the entire year. She is the daughter of Ronnie Stokes, a former member of the OSU men's basketball team (1982-1985) and the color commentator on the Buckeye Radio Sports Network. At 5'10", she towers over her dad.

Taylor Hill – 5'10" freshman shooting guard. Taylor played varsity basketball as an eighth grader in Minneapolis and lead the state in scoring with 22.5 points per game. Are you kidding me? She holds the career scoring record in Minnesota high school (boy or girl) with 3,894 points. Taylor's brother is P.J. Hill; I wonder if she can take him one on one.

Aleksandra Dobranic – 6'4" freshman center. Aleksandra is from Nova Sad, Serbia. I have no idea if she can play, but she certainly has a fresh [face](#).

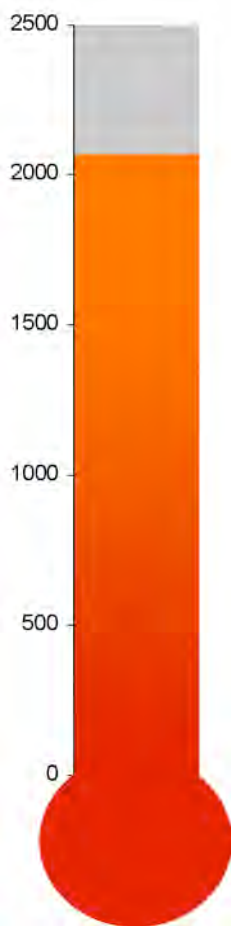
The Best of the Rest

SCHOLARSHIP UPDATE

We started this season with short-term and long-term scholarship goals for our club. The short-term goal (2009 football season) was to raise \$1000 for our fund. William Buford makes the kind of quantum leap from freshman to sophomore that Turner made last year, and if the rest of the team dedicates themselves to rebounding and defense, I can see this team winning the Big Ten and making noise in the post season. If not, then they will be doing well to finish 3rd (as predicated) in a conference that is much deeper this year than last.

The Future

If the lack of new faces on this year's team makes you wonder if Matta has lost his recruiting mojo, you can put your mind at ease. OSU lost two scholarships this year due a low APR (American Progress Rate) score. You can chalk this chalk up to the one-and-done players and the circumstances under which they left school. The details are boring, but it is enough to say that the NCAA is trying to make sure that athletes in the money sports get their degrees. The NCAA's heart is in the right place, but the implementation leaves something to be desired.

In 2010 Matta will bring in the consensus number 1 recruiting class. They are:

Jared Sullinger – 6'8", power forward, top 5 player

Deshaun Thomas – 6'7", small forward, top 10 player

Jordan Sibert – 6'4", 185, shooting guard, top 100 player

Lenzelle Smith – 6'4", 205, shooting guard, top 100 player

Aaron Craft – 6'2", 190, a highly recruited point guard. Craft originally committed to Tennessee, then switched allegiance to OSU. He was also one of the top quarterback recruits in the state of Ohio.

J.D. Weatherspoon – 6'6", 200, small forward.

Weatherspoon, the talk of last year's state tournament in Ohio, is a raw talent but easily the best athlete in the class.

There are lots of interesting connections in this group:

- Jared Sullinger is J.J. Sullinger's brother.
- Sullinger, Sibert, Craft and Weatherspoon all play on the country's top AAU team, All Ohio Red.
- Sullinger and Weatherspoon are teammates at Northland High School.
- Northland won the Ohio big school state championship over Liberty Benton High School, which Craft led to the championship game.
